# COMMUNITY SERVICES BOARD REPORT



### **TEXAS HAF**

Our Texas Homeowner's Assistance Grant is ending early due to the funds from the US Treasury being 91% expended. The grant will end on July 12, 2023.

#### **CSBG/TBRA**

Our Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Transition out of Poverty (TOP) Program currently has 30 individuals enrolled with a goal of transitioning 17 individuals to self-reliance by the end of 2023. So far, 6 individuals have successfully completed the program.

CSBG direct client expenses were \$14,077.93 from 05.01.23 to date.

We are still in the process of renewing our RSP (Reservation System Participation) Agreement for our Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program. At this time, we are currently serving 45 households.



### **CEAP/LIHWAP**

For the month of May, 2023, to date, CEAP has paid \$300,749.87 and \$3,377,755.96 cumulatively for 2023.

LIHWAP has paid \$66,336.67 for the month of May, 2023, and \$423,252.01 to date.
